American Realists of the Early 1900s. Overview. With forty percent of the United States' population living in urban environments by 1900, the city began to replace the countryside as an intriguing subject for American writers and painters. Also, these city dwellers' demands for illustrated newspapers and magazines meant that many artists in the early twentieth century trained as sketch reporters who could quickly capture the action at fires or strikes, sports events or theater premieres.

An important influence on the development of American art during the early 20th century was the American photographer, editor, and art dealer Alfred Stieglitz (1864-1946), later the husband of artist Georgia O'Keeffe, who - with the help of his close colleague Edward Steichen (1879-1973) - devoted much of his energy to promoting fine art photography as well as modernist painting and sculpture ...
